Ice Climbing

Ascending Colorado's Bridal Veil

Hang on with *Wild Chronicles* as two dedicated <u>ice</u> climbers attempt to scale Bridal Veil Falls in Telluride, Colorado. A frozen <u>waterfall</u> standing more than 40 stories high, Bridal Veil was once thought nearly impossible to climb. With the added dangers of <u>avalanches</u> and giant falling icicles, these two climbers try to pick their way to the top.

QUESTIONS

- How do authorities intentionally start avalanches around Bridal Veil?
 Bombs are dropped from helicopters, triggering avalanches.
- What tools and equipment do Duncan and Nancy use to scale Bridal Veil?
 The climbers wear **helmets**, **gloves**, thick **snowsuits**, **boots**, and **crampons** (spikes attached to their boots).
 They carry **ropes**, **picks**, and **axes**.

avalanche	noun	large mass of snow and other material suddenly and quickly tumbling down a mountain.
ice	noun	water in its solid form.
waterfall	noun	flow of water descending steeply over a cliff. Also called a cascade.
